What is affordable housing? What kinds of affordable housing exist in Pasadena? How does it happen? To whom do we advocate to get it passed?



What is affordable Housing?

The government defines affordable housing in two categories...

Homeownership, spending no more than **40%** of housing cost: PITI-Principal, interest, taxes and insurance. (New York, 20%, therefore, no foreclosures)

Rental: spending no more than **30%** of your income on housing. Here's an example:

If you have \$25,000/ year salary, $1/3=7,500$, or \$625 a month, plus utility allowance perhaps \$75/month, so they pay the landlord \$550.

Income Levels and AMI

Income bands help the government define the affordable housing need, and it helps funders to determine what level of subsidies are needed for the various income levels. The income levels are based on the AMI—the Area Median Income.

The incomes stated below are based on the AMI for Pasadena for maximum allowed for four-person household:

- 80 to 120% of the AMI is **moderate** (\$77,750)
- 50 to 80% of the AMI is **low-income** (\$68,300)
- 30 to 50% of the AMI is **very-low** (\$42,700)
- Less than 30% of the AMI is **extremely-low** (\$25,600)

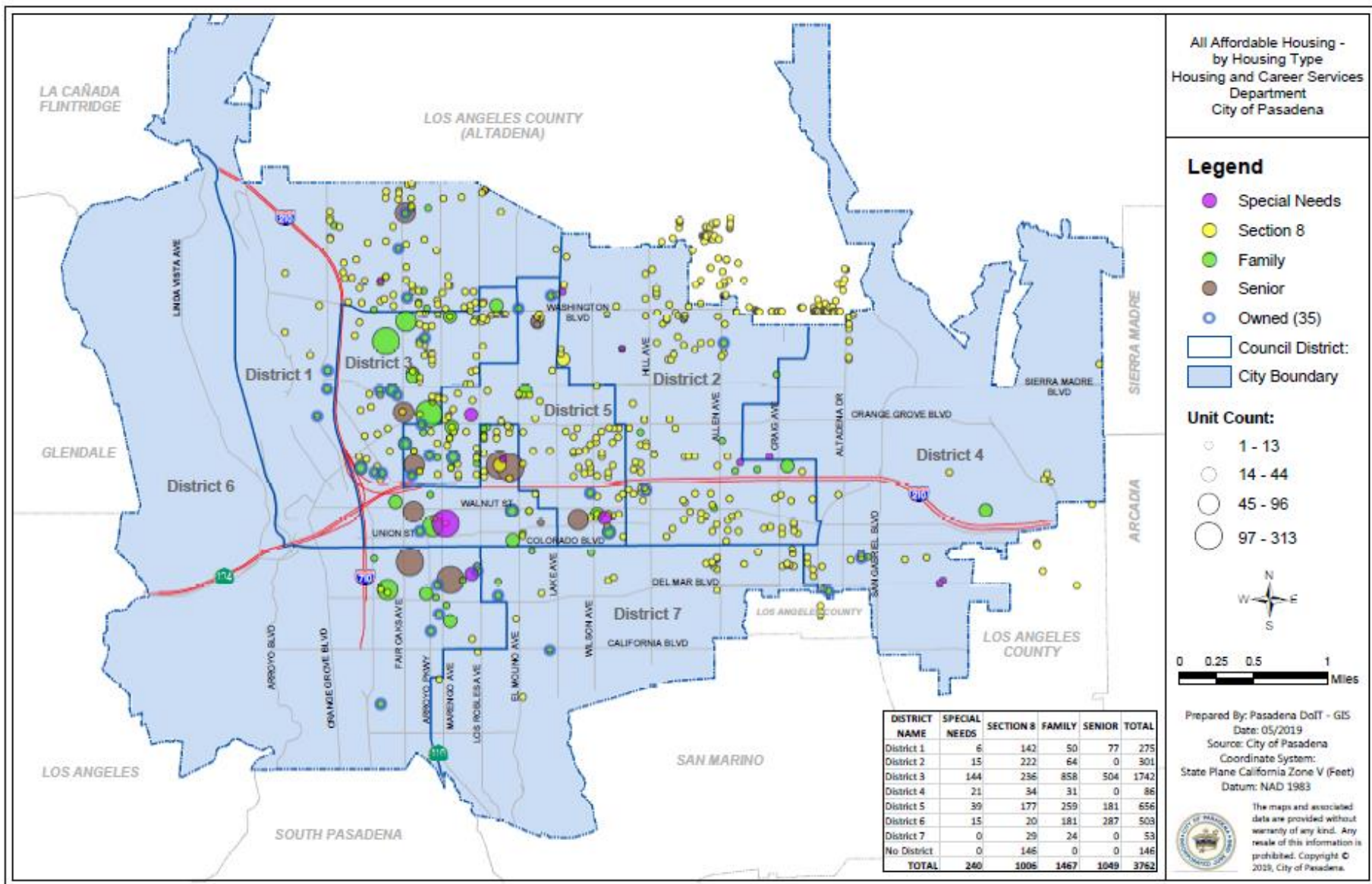
